QUALITY ENHANCEMENT PLAN: The First Five Years

In 2007 EKU adopted its first QEP: *EKU will graduate informed critical and creative thinkers who communicate effectively.*

In spring 2013 we submitted the five-year QEP progress report. Comments from SACS about our QEP efforts were all positive! View the report and comments from SACS on the QEP website.

Early QEP efforts focused on initiatives designed to promote QEP goals, and educate the campus community. The Paul & Elder Model was adopted as a common language for teaching a process of critical/creative thinking.

These efforts led to a shift in institutional culture and QEP goals became an essential part of the University Strategic Plan: Every academic program must have student learning outcomes focused on critical/creative thinking and communication, and to evaluate those outcomes at the program level.

ASSURANCE OF LEARNING

What is Assurance of Learning? Assurance of learning is a process of evaluating student outcomes to assure that students graduate with the knowledge and skills that are essential for their future lives and careers

Who decides what to evaluate? Outcomes must include critical/creative thinking and communication, but faculty identify the *program-specific* knowledge and skills that students should have before graduation.

How are the outcomes evaluated? Faculty design senior-level assignments through which students demonstrate their knowledge and skills. Faculty evaluate students' work based on expectations and criteria set by the program's faculty members.

MOCK INTERVIEWS
